

Welcome to the Parish Church of St. John the Divine, Victoria. We are a community of faith in the Anglican Tradition, seeking to live lives of faith, hope and love as part of this community of Downtown Victoria. We are on a journey of learning to be a welcoming, inviting, inclusive and serving community which is open to all.

Our worship reflects our rootedness in the Anglican tradition, whilst drawing on liturgies that reflect the long history and heritage of our Christian faith. Please join in as you feel able, and enjoy the words, music and opportunity for prayer and to be a part of our community.

If our service seems unfamiliar, please follow the cues from our leaflet, the ministers leading the service and those around you. Most of our Sunday morning worship services have the Eucharist, or Holy Communion, at the heart of our worship – please feel free to join us, whatever your tradition, in the sharing of bread and wine, at the station nearest to where you are seated. Gluten free wafers are available at all stations: Please indicate if you need one.

Within the Anglican Church of Canada (under the advice of the Primate and the Chief Medical Officer for Canada) we would ask that bread is not dipped into the wine, as this has the potential to spread infection in a way that the sharing of the cup does not. If you would prefer not to share the cup then receiving only bread is considered 'full communion' (also known as 'Communion in One Kind').

If there is anything that you wish to talk about, please do take the opportunity to talk to the worship leaders, ministers and other members of the congregation following the service. If you wish to receive prayer for yourself or for another, there will be members of our Healing Prayer group in the south Quadra entrance who would be happy to pray with you as the Holy Communion is shared.

After our service we usually share coffee and an opportunity to get to know one another, in the Church Hall – through the door on the front left hand side. We have many visitors and newcomers here so please make yourself known to folks as you feel comfortable.

You are very welcome here. We don't always get it right; please let us know when we do, and when we don't. Please stay and be a part of our family, for however long you would like.







Ted Hughes talks!

You are invited to a conversation with BC's most distinguished public-sector jurist on Child Protection, Conflicted Premiers, the Suppression of Protests, and the Public Interest.

Wednesday, Feb. 7, 5:00 – 6:30 p.m., Fraser Building, Room 159, University of Victoria Interviewed by CBC journalist Laura Lynch. Special guests David Eby, QC, Attorney-General of BC; Maureen Maloney, SFU, former Deputy Attorney-General of BC and Dean of Law at UVic.

Parishioner Ted Hughes has had a long career defending the vulnerable and fighting corruption. Hughes was appointed BC's Deputy Attorney General in 1983 and BC's first Conflict-of-Interest Commissioner in 1990. He conducted investigations that led to the resignation of former Premier Bill Vander Zalm, the establishment of The Office of the Representative for Children and Youth, and a reconsideration of how police should handle major protests. He was one of the first government officials to seek justice for residential school survivors. He has recently "partially" retired at the age of 90.

Books! - We're trying to develop a collection of Indigenous books for our library. You will find a few in a basket at the Garden Door which may be borrowed. If you can contribute any, they would be most welcome. Please leave them in the book return in the Denson Lounge or with Carol-Ann in the office.

The January blue envelope is for refugee ministry. Parish Council has approved the sponsorship of an orthodox Christian family of 9 Eritreans who are expected to be arriving in late March or early April. Thank you to those who volunteered to get involved and help with the settlement process from time to time over about the next six months. We could still use a few more volunteers if you have time in the next six months. If you are new to this the Diocese will provide an orientation and a link for a Criminal Record Check. There is a detailed job list and sign-up at https://www.volunteersignup.org/BFCJ3

Our parish has a joint refugee ministry with First Met, where Kathy Cook is leading the organisation of our sponsorship of a Syrian single Mom and her two teen children. This sponsorship has sprung a budgetary leak: When the family arrives the daughter is unlikely to be eligible for the Canada Child Benefit so the proceeds of this blue envelope will be helping to provide additional support for the Syrian family.

Update from Parish Council

December meeting:

- At the meeting Alastair announced that Jacqueline Gillespie is St. John's Safe Church person. She is the person to whom any incidents should be reported.
- The profit from the Christmas Bazaar, as of the end of November, is \$5,136.
- The Property Committee report welcomed Betty Miller as a new member, noted that the lighting project is underway and that they are looking at new signage for the church.
- David gave a music report, noting that he will follow-up on the organ project in the new year.
- A short meeting followed by Christmas cheer.


January meeting:

- Chris Eve sought and received approval from Parish Council for a new sponsorship plan for an Eritrean Christian family of 9, the Ghebremeskels.
- Treasurer Kate McCabe presented the year end financials.
- Joan presented the Finance Committee's proposal for a new way of organizing the parish finances, to be in line with how we actually operate, and a budget for 2018. The new approach and budget were approved and will be presented to Vestry.
- Alastair noted in his Ministry report what his work as an Archdeacon entails and that he is spending a day a month on these duties.
- Rhoda gave an update on the Chapel Project noting the chairs have been shipped and are on the way. Four pews have been sold and the remainder will be sent to Kilshaw for auction. We will be creating a work party to engage the community helping to unpack the chairs and install the book racks on the back. The pews are in the process of being removed. Temporary chairs may be required for a short period of time. Plans to paint the chapel are in progress. The Diocesan Visioning Fund has provided \$10,000.00 for replacing the chapel doors and including Indigenous art work on the doors and the arch above. An application to The Anglican Foundation of Canada for additional funding for this project is being prepared.
- Rhoda presented a report from the Redevelopment Committee noting that as contamination is present in the soils around the church, a study to determine the extent is needed before anything can be done about developing the site. 3 quotes have been obtained, ranging from \$20,000 to \$30,000. After much discussion there was agreement to have the committee decide on the appropriate quote and bring it back for approval.
- The Nominating Committee is looking for new members of Parish Council, Synod delegates and an Assistant Warden.
- Duane reported on the new website being developed that they hope to have live very soon.
 He noted that the coming year will be his 20th as WebMaster, and his last.
- It was decided that this would be the final meeting of Parish Council before Vestry on Feb. 25th. Alastair thanked those leaving for their service: Rhoda Brodie-Smith, Trevor Elton, Doug Sheepwash and Michael Zenger, and Rector's Warden Duane Lecky. He noted that the group has functioned well together and that it had been a pleasure to work with.

Candlemas

They came, as called, according to the Law.

Lent is nearly upon us and as we begin thinking about what we can do in the weeks following Ash Wednesday (Feb. 14th, yes it's Valentine's Day!) I would like to encourage us all to consider taking up a devotional book for the days of Lent.

Queering Lent is a collection of 41 poems, one for each day of Lent and one for Easter, that explore queerness and Christianity and the queerness of Christianity. Written as a Lenten discipline by slats, a queer/trans/nonbianary Presbyterian who works as a theatre director, sound designer, and pastor, this collection is one of the resources St. John's is offering for our Lenten reading discipline this year. Books are available to order through the office or directly via Amazon.ca/local bookstore.

*This collection contains references to transphobia, violence against trans people, mental illness and suicide. Also we hope to have a book study based on the book I referenced in a recent sermon; it is called *Radical Reconciliation* and is by Allan Boesak and Curtiss DeYoung – this book will form the basis of our Wednesday **Lunch With a Point** meetings, which will begin on Wed., Feb. 21st at noon in the Denson Lounge, but is a book which I recommend reading over this time. I will be producing study notes for this book which we will be using on Wednesdays but they will also be available on request. This book is also available through the office/online/local bookstores – please have orders in to the office by Feb. 9th.

FOCUS - What Does God Require? Spirituality and Genre in the Bible

Time: Four Thursdays, 7pm-9pm, beginning February 22 at The Church of St. John the Divine, Quadra Street

Thursday, February 22, "Apocalyptic Spirituality." The apocalyptic is a specific genre of Biblical literature first found in post-exilic Jewish writings, further developed in second temple Judaism and the early church, and echoed in millenarian movements throughout the history of the church. It focuses on visions, the end times, and heavenly messengers. We will look at the spirituality embedded in this genre and the role this spirituality plays in the formation of Christian individuals and institutions. Instructor: The Rev. Canon Bruce Bryant-Scott.

Thursday, March 1, "Liturgy and Faith." All the major religious traditions generate liturgical frameworks in which believers come together to re-enact the movements of faith. Because it engages the body as well as the mind, the public expression of religion as it flows through the cycles of the calendar and the sacraments of faith has not always been viewed as a distinct spirituality. For many millions of believers, however, liturgical practice, by opening up a spiritual space, has become a road to divine encounter. Both inside the Bible (the Levitical prescriptions of temple worship, for example, and the church liturgies in the pastoral epistles) and outside it (the many manuals of church order and worship in historical Christianity), a large body of literature witnesses to the significance of this spirituality. Instructor: Archdeacon Alastair McCollum.

Thursday, March 8, "Wisdom Literature and the Mystical Journey." The wisdom books of the Hebrew Scriptures, Job, Proverbs, certain Psalms, and Ecclesiastes/Quohelet (for Jews and Protestant Christians) and Sirach and the Wisdom of Solomon (for Roman Catholics), are only part of a larger tradition of wisdom spirituality that has influenced Judaism and Christianity. Wisdom spirituality calls attention to the wider human picture in which faith occurs. Known as the "documents of Hebrew humanism," wisdom literature uses pithy sayings, insightful analogies and stories, wide-ranging philosophical reflections, and mystical insights to lead its adherents on a journey toward the divine. We will consider in this session how this spirituality manifests itself in both nascent Christianity and classical Judaism. Instructor: Dr. Kem Luther.

Thursday, March 15, "Prophetic and Social Spirituality." In the multi-millennial history of Judaism and Christianity, believers have discovered, time and again, that a focus on just action and just living can become a framework for divine encounter. In the decalogue and continuing into the prophetic tradition, we recognize an emphasis on social and spiritual transformation that shapes the journey of those who commit themselves to it. The major and minor prophets of the Hebrew scriptures, books that are a major focus within the gospels and certain New Testament letters (notably are attributed to James) add a literary dimension to prophetic spirituality. Instructor: The Rev. Canon Philip Wadham.
