

Welcome to the Parish Church of St. John the Divine, Victoria. We are a community of faith in the Anglican Tradition, seeking to live lives of faith, hope and love as part of this community of Downtown Victoria. We are on a journey of learning to be a welcoming, inviting, inclusive and serving community which is open to all.

Our worship reflects our rootedness in the Anglican tradition, whilst drawing on liturgies that reflect the long history and heritage of our Christian faith. Please join in as you feel able, and enjoy the words, music and opportunity for prayer and to be a part of our community.

If our service seems unfamiliar, please follow the cues from our leaflet, the ministers leading the service and those around you. Most of our Sunday morning worship services have the Eucharist, or Holy Communion, at the heart of our worship – please feel free to join us, whatever your tradition, in the sharing of bread and wine. Gluten free wafers are available: Please indicate if you need one.

Within the Anglican Church of Canada (under the advice of the Primate and the Chief Medical Officer for Canada) we would ask that bread is not dipped into the wine, as this has the potential to spread infection in a way that the sharing of the cup does not. If you would prefer not to share the cup then receiving only bread is considered 'full communion' (also known as 'Communion in One Kind').

If there is anything that you wish to talk about, please do take the opportunity to talk to the worship leaders, ministers and other members of the congregation following the service. If you wish to receive prayer for yourself or for another, there will be members of our Healing Prayer group in the south Quadra entrance who would be happy to pray with you as the Holy Communion is shared.

After our service we usually share coffee and an opportunity to get to know one another, in the Church Hall – through the door on the front left hand side. We have many visitors and newcomers here so please make yourself known to folks as you feel comfortable.

You are very welcome here. We don't always get it right; please let us know when we do, and when we don't. Please stay and be a part of our family, for however long you would like.

Immediately after receiving, go to the prayer station in the south Quadra entrance. Briefly state your need. The prayer team will lay hands on your shoulders and will pray quietly for you.

The Special Blue Envelope for October is Out of the Rain

The Out of the Rain Youth Night Shelter is a community project, providing shelter to homeless youth during the coldest months of the year. A coalition of community agencies, faith-based organizations, businesses, and individual volunteers work together to provide space, professional support, and food for the shelter. The shelter rotates among host sites in the community. Out of the Rain volunteers support staff as helpers or cook hot meals.

Out of the Rain News:

Our weekly night shelter for homeless kids is now open. We provide a safe warm space for them to sleep, a hot supper, a muffin breakfast and 2 youth workers who supervise overnight. We serve around 15-25 kids each Monday night over the winter. If you feel like you might like to help, you can provide a hot casserole, stay and serve it if you like, or provide 4 dozen muffins, or (a favourite) provide 4 dozen cookies. With enough volunteers you would only need to do this about twice during the season, which ends April 15, 2020. Other donations we love to have are hot chocolate (the kind you mix with water), hot sauce, ketchup, tea, coffee, peanut butter and jam. Our donation bin is in the back hallway near the Denson Lounge. Please contact Karyn Lehmann.

Finance Committee Report for Third Quarter 2019

The Finance Committee provides this operating statement for January 1 to September 30, 2019, to keep you informed of St. John the Divine's financial status relative to the budget approved by Vestry. Detailed financial statements are also posted monthly on the bulletin board at the front of the church. We continue to closely monitor our finances and to explain our financial story as we strive to keep daily operating costs down, reduce our deficit, and increase revenues while maintaining our church building.

Givings continue to be less than planned, but there is a trend to more electronic giving, and fewer envelopes.

So far, overall Operating Expenses are also less than planned, which helps us stay on budget.

Also, we have received several bequests in 2019, (one for \$76,524).

Our policy is to take only a portion of this into current revenue, so our Legacies and Special Gifts Fund has grown by \$66,524.

In Capital Expenditures are amounts needed to finish the Sanctuary Lighting, Chapel Refurbishment, and other needed projects. The budget includes \$48,000 for the ramp.

The Longer Term

As we start Budget preparation for 2020, we must remember our Operating Budget for 2019 has a deficit of \$98,676, which was a step along our planned road to balancing our Operating Budget within 5 years. In Vestry 2019, we also adopted our Strategic Plan, which is evolving into a Capital Plan for the next 5-10 years. This Capital Plan will strive to plan future projects with funding in place. This contrasts with the Sanctuary Lighting project, which was underfunded when it had to be started – donations are still welcome to reduce the current shortfall of \$64,339.
